

If you have not already been made aware of what this means take a look at page 5.

If you look a few pages further on you will see that Linton House, which some of the older residents will remember as Dexters - a village store - used to be, is possibly to become an Off License.

The future of these two establishments may bring about small changes to the village street, and there are questions about what is to become of what was Moriarty's. Hopefully it won't just languish as the building did for so many years once Nunn's hardware shop ceased trading.

It's many years, as was recounted in a recent article, since The Street was a 'thriving' commercial thoroughfare.

On Wednesday 15th May there was an excellent piano recital in St Mary's which was enjoyed by a pleasing number of people, it was the start of a new season of Music in St Mary's, details of which were given in the April edition of the Observer. Do look out for future dates, which appear in the Diary of Events pages.

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
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WALSHAM-LE-WILLOWS CEVC PRIMARY SCHOOL

SIX BELLS FOR SALE

The owner (Admiral Taverns) of The Six Bells Public House in Walsham le Willows has given notice that they intend to dispose of the property.

Because the Six Bells has been registered as an Asset of Community Value, a six week 'interim moratorium' has now been triggered during which it cannot be sold to allow eligible community groups to submit an expression of interest to bid.

The 'interim moratorium' will end on 14 June 2024 unless Mid Suffolk District Council receives a valid expression of interest during the period, which would trigger the 'full moratorium' period of six months delaying the disposal of the asset before 3 November 2024.

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

CITIZENS ADVICE



We've booked a package holiday to Spain. It's our first time booking this sort of getaway, and a friend recently had a terrible experience when things went wrong on a similar trip. What sort of help is available if something does go wrong?

Hopefully you'll have a lovely time but if something does go wrong with your package holiday, Citizens Advice has lots of information about what to do and what compensation you may be eligible for.

Examples of things going wrong include:

- If the holiday you went on turned out to be lower in value than the one you originally booked.
- The hotel was a bus ride away from the beach rather than across the road as advertised.
- Big parts of the trip you booked didn't happen or services weren't provided, for example a planned two-day excursion was cancelled, and no alternative was organised.

It's worth noting that you can't get compensation if you simply didn't enjoy the holiday or if the problem was out of the holiday company's control - like bad weather.

If something does go wrong, firstly, tell the company or travel agent you booked with as soon as possible. Don't wait until you get home. And check the information you received when you made the booking to see what you're supposed to get.



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STANTON AND DISTRICT BRANCH ROYAL BRITISH LEGION



At our recent monthly meeting members were told that the 4 wreaths that were laid at our war memorial on Remembrance Sunday, last year and later placed in the church porch to protect them against the weather have disappeared. At the time of writing these notes they have not been found.

On Thursday 6 June to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the D Day landings a wreath will be laid on our war memorial at 11am in memory of those who did not return home.

Sadly 2 men from Walsham died in the days that followed. Albert's father Bombardier Amos Largent 33 Field Regt Royal Artillery, after being rescued from the beach at Dunkirk in 1940 returned to France on D day and died 9th July 1944.

Janet's father, Petty Officer Ralph Kerridge Royal Naval Patrol Service was on the H.M. Trawler Vidonia transporting supplies to France when there was a collision in very thick fog. All the 8 crew members died on 7th October 1944.

There will be a D Day 80 Suffolk Remembers service on Thursday 6th June in St Edmundsbury cathedral commencing at 5.30pm. The Lord Lieutenant of the County, Lady Clare, Countess of Euston will attend the service and Bishop Martin Seeley, The Bishop of St Edmundsbury and Ipswich will give the address. The service will be open to all serving members of the armed forces, R.B.L. members their families and veterans. A beacon will be lit at 9.30pm in the Abbey Gardens.

Our branch will be holding a Table Top sale on Saturday 6 July in the Cock Yard Stanton 10am to 12 noon. Branch funds at the time of going to press were £2357.36. The next branch meeting will be held on Tuesday 11th June at the Cock Inn Stanton at

8pm.

GARDENING FOR GOOD THIS Works!

THIS is **The Horticulture Industry Scheme** CIC – or THIS for short – a not-for-profit company which is 7 years old and looking to expand out of the Thetford area. The workers are all paid at least the Living Wage and have all experienced problems that have created barriers to employment. Homelessness in the past is hugely common, along with the other issues that accompany it. But the workers are on their way up again, with the support of Tim Melvin and Georgina Keatley, THIS founders, and each other. The work ethic is something to behold, teamwork and mutual respect is central to the ethos. As workers find their feet, they are either supported to find other careers to go to or given further training in horticulture. One worker recently gained a merit in Horticulture through the Norfolk School of Gardening and is about to start a garden design course.

As a CIC, THIS are partly funded by grants and partly by earned income. Recent funding streams have seen them offer free gardening sessions for people whose gardens have 'got away from them' and aren't able to manage them. These have been hugely rewarding and new friendships have been made, some in Walsham, a community that has welcomed them warmly, which is why THIS is keen to do more work in this beautiful village.

THIS has worked with over 70 individuals and has a proven record of helping people move on in their lives. If THIS is of interest to you - look out for their advert in this edition.

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SUMMERTIME IN THE WILD WOODS



Big Butterfly Count- July 21st

Why not join us to count butterflies? Our new wild flower meadow areas are full of flowering species, we have been amazed by the wealth of plant variety in just their first season. This should be an ideal place to spot butterflies. We are hoping to be joined by a member of the Suffolk Butterfly Conservation Group who will be on hand to help with identification. We will also have butterfly ID cards and recommend The Big Butterfly Count free app. This citizen science project helps inform us all about the changing numbers of different butterfly populations and the ways climate change and biodiversity loss are impacting our native species as they try to adapt and survive. Spending time just waiting for butterflies and watching is a perfect way to spend a little of your summertime. If you are unable to join us, you can still take part in the project in the woods, in your garden or any wild space anytime from July 12th through to August 4th.

Thirsty Work

Cold beers and soft drinks will be served on an evening of "ragwort pulling"! As part of the terms of our tenancy, we have undertaken to pull ragwort as this is a species considered dangerous to livestock. In fact, as a boy my Dad was paid a few pennies to do the exact same thing on Wortham Common many moons ago. Again, help with identification will be on hand as there are many similar species flowering at this time which we do not want to lose. Please watch out for details of this evening of camaraderie as the exact date and timings will be finalised nearer the time.

Our annual general meeting will take place in the Jubilee Wood off Wattisfield Road on Monday 8th July. We will be reporting on our activities for the previous year and looking forward to the year ahead. All are welcome to come along so put the date in your diary.

WALSHAM LE WILLOWS PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES

of the ANNUAL meeting held on Wednesday 8th May 2024 commencing at 7.00 p.m. in the Memorial Hall.

[Informally approved. Formal approval, at the next meeting with any corrections] **PRESENT:** Cllrs. Bartholomew, Roberts, Tuck & Winch.

ALSO PRESENT: District Cllr. Richard Winch, County Cllr. Jessica Fleming

- 1. ELECTION OF CHAIR
 - a. In the absence of Cllr Belson, Cllr Bartholomew took the chair as acting vice chair. Cllr Roberts proposed Cllr Belson who had indicated his willingness to be elected in his absence. This was unanimously approved.
 - b. Council agreed that Cllr Belson's Declaration of Acceptance of Office could be signed at the June meeting.
- 2. APPOINTMENT OF VICE CHAIR It was agreed that Cllr J Winch chair the meeting for this appointment. Cllr Roberts proposed Cllr Bartholomew as vice chair and this was unanimously approved.
- 3. APOLOGIES
 - a. Apologies received from Cllrs Belson & Brookes for reason of both being on holiday. Apologies received from Cllr Mecrow for reason of family commitments.
 - b. Consent was given for all apologies.
- 4. DECLARATIONS of Pecuniary & Non-Pecuniary Interests
 - a. No declarations of pecuniary, local non-pecuniary interest(s) incl. personal interests in items on the agenda or declarations of any gifts of hospitality were received.
 - b. No declarations of lobbying for planning matters on the agenda were received.
 - c. No dispensations required.
- 5. MINUTES To Receive and consider the minutes of the following meetings (as previously circulated)
 - a. Minutes of the meeting held on 10th April 2024 were approved for signing as true and accurate record and were duly signed.
 - b. Actions outstanding from last meeting were reviewed. Cllr Roberts had streetlamp adjustment and adjustments to play area gates in hand. Clerk following up bus shelter and notice board maintenance, and grit bin removal.
- 6. REPORTS FOR INFORMATION & QUESTIONS to receive written reports & put questions:
 - a. District Councillor Winch Cllr R Winch advised that there was as yet no reply to queries on planning process re the decision for Vine Cottages and that the Joint Local Plan was about to be issued.
 - b. County Councillor Fleming (joined meeting later) spoke to the consultation on the network study on the Norwich to Tilbury proposals. She urged the Parish

Council to respond to the consultation and noted that SCC opposed the proposals and would prefer the undersea lines which although would take longer and be more costly, would have less impact local economy including tourism, housing values. Cllr R Winch made the point that national representatives of both main parties had not indicated any objections. Cllr Bartholomew proposed that the Parish Council considers responding after reference to Cllr Belson when he returns.

Cllr R Winch invited Cllr Fleming to the walkabout meeting to clarify the Palmer St footpath proposals as distinct from those on Summer Road. Cllr R Winch to send Cllr Fleming the details.

- 7. PUBLIC FORUM To receive questions and matters of concern from members of the public in attendance with regard to items on the agenda and any other matters. No members of the public were present.
- 8. REPORTS FROM WORKING GROUPS (Flood, CEP, Traffic) & ACTION LOG REVIEWS
 - a. The report on progress and next steps with Community Emergency Plan (circulated 30/04/2024) was noted. Cllr Bartholomew further reported that there are currently 18 potential volunteers who have indicated intention to attend the meeting on 6th June at 18:30 in the Memorial Hall.
 - b. It was noted that a meeting has been set up by the Flood Group with Environment Agency contact following submission of reports re flooding. This will take place on 29th May and there is an indication that one of the EA people attending will be able to give input into the Community Emergency Plan and another has expertise in land management in relation to flooding.

The Clerk will send out invitations to residents affected by flooding to an initial informal meeting with the councillors involved in the Flood Group and other councillors on 19th June. This will not be a public meeting of the Parish Council.

- c. The report from the Traffic group was noted (circulated 30/04/2024) and proposed the following:
 - i. To approve, in principle, adoption of the revised plan
 - ii. To agree that the first 7 points of plan should be the first step
 - iii. To consider allocating budget for traffic consultant input prior to submission to SCC highways

There was a discussion about when in the process a consultant should be engaged and about there being a very clear brief before engagement. Subject to those considerations the proposals from the traffic group were unanimously agreed. Clerk to obtain indicative costings from traffic consultants for June meeting. Cllr J Winch to send details of consultant that she has to Clerk.

9. PARISH COUNCIL OBJECTIVES 2024/25 (not covered under working groups -Footpaths, Shepherd's Grove, Bus Routes, Local Plan) The discussions between Cllr R Winch and Cllr Jessica Fleming (agenda item 5) were considered and it was agreed that following email circulated by Cllr Belson, clarifying the situation, that the footpaths issues be dealt with separately to traffic issues. A separate action log has been created by the Clerk. It was suggested that Cllrs Belson and Mecrow might be best placed to lead on the footpaths issues. And





that once the scheduled Palmer Street walkabout meeting (with MSDC representatives) has taken place to delineate the different locations involved, the next steps will be to wait for matters to be taken forward MSDC as part of their work plans.

- 10. PLANNING MATTERS
 - a. It was noted that Parish Services survey 2024 (to inform housing allocations in Local Plan) was completed and submitted by Cllr Belson with assistance from the Clerk and that acknowledgement of the details submitted and accepted had been obtained.
 - b. The lumps of tarmac that have appeared on Fishponds Lane were discussed and it was clarified by Cllr Bartholomew that he had not implied that this was put there by developers as the Clerk's agenda item had suggested. The Clerk apologised for the misunderstanding. It was decided that this matter should be deferred to the footpaths working party to deal with.
 - c. Attendance at the A1088 Stowlangtoft Bridge Liaison Group meeting on Friday 24th May at 1pm was discussed. Cllr Mecrow had already indicated that he might be available to attend. Clerk to establish if Cllr Mecrow can confirm and copy in Cllrs Belson and Roberts.
 - d. 


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GREEN DILEMMAS



The argument around solar farms

There are a growing number of applications for solar farms in our region and the planned size of these farms is getting larger. There is currently a proposal for a solar farm near Mendlesham which would be over 750 acres equivalent to 425 football pitches. These projects are so large that any decisions are being made by central government bypassing the local planning authority.

For the stakeholders involved, solar farms represent a very safe return on investment. They offer farmers a reliable income which is more than they get from growing crops and the companies involved are guaranteed predictable revenue and costs for 40 years. There are some strong arguments in favour of larger solar farms:

- We have to have a lot more renewable energy to combat the impact of climate change. The UK target is for a solar capacity of 70 gigawatts by 2035 (currently we have c.15-20 gigawatts deployed).
- The national grid is designed to take power from a small number of large locations (like power stations). Taking power from smaller units requires significant network upgrades.
- The targeted 70 gigawatts will only require a land area equivalent to 0.5% of English farmland. Conversely climate change is by far the biggest risk to food production with wet weather alone predicted to reduce Britain's wheat crop by 25% this year.

The main arguments against the increasing reliance on these larger solar farms are:

- Huge farms cause major disruption to the look and feel of the local environment and therefore mitigation measures like buffer zones need much higher priority. The Sunnica solar farm planned on the Cambridgeshire / Suffolk border would stretch the equivalent distance from Walsham Le Willows to Elmswell and the battery storage of 6 metre containers will require over 70 acres alone.
- We shouldn't use prime grade agricultural land as this should be preserved for food production. We should deploy as much solar as possible on brownfield sites and rooftops. Analysis suggests that this could generate 25 gigawatts of electricity annually. Many European countries are doing far more than the UK to prioritise roofs, car parks and brownfield sites.
- We are still not investing heavily in the grid infrastructure for connecting smaller sites.
- We should prioritise household production and storage of energy via solar panels and batteries.
- Energy cost savings from solar farms are not being passed on to the local community. There should be some kind of share ownership which would result in lower electricity bills.
- The apparent biodiversity net gain when a solar farm is deployed is just a reflection on the nature depleted state of most arable farm land.

Currently the market is geared up to primarily focus on larger solar farms. Other more distributed options are being ignored.

WILDLIFE IN JUNE

June is upon us now and you will be seeing fledgling baby birds in your gardens, especially if you have cover and a food source nearby. The newly fledged birds will not be that strong on the wing and will flutter about from ground level to a few meters high. Both parents will be nearby and if you wait and watch you will see them bringing food to the youngster, usually for a week or two until they are able to fend for themselves. With birds in mind an update on our camera nest box, all is well, all 7 eggs hatched around a day apart and we were left watching the little helpless naked babies, while mum ate the eggshells that were left behind. Within two weeks they have completely changed, it seemed everyday the babies looked and acted different to the last. They have gone from being naked and blind to now eyes open and almost fully feathered. Both parents are busier than ever trying to feed their brood, they come back from the bird table with seeds and also caterpillars from the garden, I often wonder how on earth they find these caterpillars so quickly! We shall be looking forward to soon seeing the chicks fledge the nest and hopefully they will stay in the garden for a while.

Have you ever seen on Hawthorn a web that looks like it was left over from Halloween? This is from the Hawthorn Moth. The caterpillar larvae feed communally within a silken web which is spun on the Hawthorn after mining the leaves. They spin this web as a way of protection against predators and parasites. You may also see this webbing on Blackthorn and Cotoneaster. This species of Moth will be on the wing by June and July where it can be attracted to light. It is a small whitish Moth with a wingspan of around 11-15mm, with dark markings, which can very in colour but they are normally reddish.

June is the month of baby deer. It's now the peak time for deer to give birth. It is important to remember the natural behaviour of these animals is that they leave their young lying in vegetation while they move off to feed. Baby deer are on to their feet to suckle within about half an hour after birth, but are very unsteady for the first day or so of life and are unable to follow their mother or outrun a predator. Consequently, the mother leaves her youngster, the fawn gives off virtually no scent, lying up in long vegetation, and the mother goes to feed somewhere else, only about 50m away, but up to about a kilometre away after a couple of days. She will returning several times over the course of the day to suckle. When the youngster is a few days old and much more steady on its feet, it will find its own hiding places and lie in wait for its mother to return. If you come across a baby deer lying up in the undergrowth, with its mother nowhere to be seen, do not touch it or take it in to a rescue centre unless it has been injured or its mother has been killed. It is very rare for mothers to abandon their offspring. So, if you stumble across a baby deer this month, it is best to leave it where it is, the mother knows it is there and will be back to feed it later. Towards the end of the month the youngsters will be up and about following their mothers, and can sometimes be found playing in groups.

Tuesday evenings are reserved for role ups and anyone looking to take up bowls will be made most welcome.



Ascended

In the day and weeks that followed the crucifixion of the Lord Jesus Christ, on that skull shaped hill outside the city walls of Jerusalem, he demonstrated the truth of his physical and bodily resurrection from the dead by appearing to, and interacting with, many people in the regions of Jerusalem and Galilee. From the record of meeting the grieving Mary Magdalen as she was alone at the tomb (John 20:17) or drawing alongside the couple on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35) or being seen of over 500 people at once, (1 Corinthians 15:6) the Bible records no less than ten such occasions when the risen Lord ministered unto, and taught his followers, preparing them for the time that they would no longer have him with them. As the Bible so ably puts it, "He shewed himself alive after his passion by many infallible proofs, being seen of them forty days, and speaking of the things pertaining to the kingdom of God". (Acts 1:3)

As we roll from one month to another, for those that follow the 'church calendar', the focus moved from the death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ at Eastertime to his return to Heaven, as Ascension Day was marked this year on Thursday 9th March, being the fortieth day of Easter, (thirty-nine days from Easter Sunday). As Jesus' time on this earth was coming to a close and time with his disciples was short, the Bible records for us that, "He opened their understanding, that they might understand the scriptures, and said unto them, Thus it is written that it behoved Christ to suffer, and to rise from the dead the third day: and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name among all nations, beginning in Jerusalem, and ye are witnesses of these things " (Luke24:45-48). But ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth. And when he had spoken these things, while they beheld, he was taken up: and a cloud received him out of their sight. And while they looked steadfastly toward heaven as he went up, behold, two men stood by them in white apparel; which also said, Ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? This same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ve have seen him go into heaven (Acts 1:8-11). The disciples then, "Returned to Jerusalem with great joy: and were continually in the temple, praising and blessing God" (Luke24:52-53).

Great interest is often taken in the last words of a person, and those of a notable person are often considered of particular significance. Among the final words of Jesus, before his ascension were, "*Repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name among all nations*" (*Luke 24:47*), so these words must be of supreme importance. It should be therefore the fervent desire of all Christians to see the glorious Gospel preached and proclaimed throughout the whole world, that multitudes may see and believe that only by repentance of sin and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, as the only Saviour, can a guilty and burdened soul find forgiveness for sin and peace with God; not just in this life, but for eternity.

Repent and turn to God. (Acts 26:20)


